[18:36] Amen. Amen. Let us hear the word of the Lord. Amen. Good morning.

Good morning. Today's reading is from Romans chapter 3, verses 21 through 28. But now, a righteousness from God, apart from law, has made known to which the law and the prophets testify.

This righteousness from God comes through faith in Jesus Christ to all who believe. There is no difference, for all have sinned and ought and fall short of the glory of God and are justified freely by his grace through the redemption that came by Jesus Christ.

God presented him as a sacrifice of atonement through faith in his blood. He did this to demonstrate his justice because in his forbearance, he had left the sins committed beforehand unpunished.

He did it to demonstrate his justice at the present time so as to be just and the one who justifies those who have faith in Jesus. Where, then, is boasting?

[20:13] It is excluded. On what principle? On that of observing the law? No, but on that of faith. For we maintain that a man is justified by faith apart from observing the law.

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God. Amen. Thank you, Wyatt. I have a question for you, church.

God. We worship God. Yeah? Okay, good. Well, who is this God that we worship the God of?

Okay. I mean, what people in the world are people that God loves and that God wants to become righteous?

Everybody? Okay. How do you know that? Yeah?

[21:19] Pretty much this is what we teach in the church, right? Yeah. And it can be summed up in a verse from 2 Peter where Peter writes, God is not willing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance.

I think it's clear in this verse of scripture that any implies that all people need to repent and that all people are qualified to repent.

the first part of that verse that I read from 2 Peter tells us that God waits patiently for us to come.

God waits patiently for us to repent. But okay, so we've got a verse in the Bible. Why do we believe that?

In our current series on basic Christian theology, we are studying Paul's letter to the Roman church. Last week, Pastor Tom spoke about how no one can be in a right relationship with God and remember we use the word righteousness to describe that state of being when we are in right relationship with God, right?

[22:46] Well, no one can be in a right relationship with God because sin is in the way of that kind of relationship and everyone is a sinner.

People can't get out of sin by themselves. They need God. We need God to provide a way. And at the point in the letter where we pick up today, Paul is explaining that there is more involved in becoming forgiven by God and saved from sin than following the laws, the rules that God provided for Israel.

This is because no human being could possibly, completely, do absolutely everything in God's law perfectly.

God and all his faithful Jewish friends spent their lives trying to keep that law, but God revealed to Paul that his human effort in keeping the law was not going to do it.

Now God has revealed something to Paul in the life and death and resurrection of Jesus Christ that he wants people to know about because God in Jesus Christ had made a new way for people to be forgiven of their sins so they can be righteous with God. [24:26] God has made the way to repair the broken relationship between God and people. It's funny though.

If you read what it says in here, the new way that God made is really a very, very ancient way. It goes all the way back to a man named Abraham who the people, who were the Jewish people regarded as the father of their faith.

And the key to God's way is just that. Faith. It is faith, as we heard in today's reading, that justifies it before God.

Faith that makes us righteous. And the spiritual truth that faith makes people right with God rather than following the law by human effort is shown in the timing, in the whole story of the human relationship with God that's told in our Bibles.

About Abraham and faith, Paul writes in Romans chapter 4, what then, I know it's there, there it is, what then shall we say that Abraham, our forefather, discovered in this matter?

[25:49] If in fact, Abraham was justified by works, he had something to boast about, but not before God. what does the scripture say?

Paul asks the people. And he quotes from Genesis chapter 15 as he says, Abraham believed God and it was credited to him as righteousness.

Abraham was right with God. He was a righteous man because of his faith and he was called righteous at a time long before God had given the law to Israel.

In fact, Abraham was called a righteous man long, long before Israel even existed.

You remember the story if you've read it. Abraham and he has his son, Isaac and his son, Jacob after him and Jacob is the one who ultimately becomes called Israel and Israel has 12 sons, 12 sons, each of whom becomes the father of a whole bunch of people who become the nation of Israel and that nation of Israel gets transported into Egypt because of a famine.

[27:21] And in Egypt, they become slaves and God sets them free under the leadership of Moses and ultimately God gives them the law to follow through Moses so that they will know how to act and what to do and how to treat each other, right?

> You remember that story. long before the law had been given, God had promised Abraham that he would be the father of many nations and that he would have a son long after he and his wife Sarah could possibly by human means have had a baby.

Even though Abraham couldn't see how such things could be possible, he still believed the promise. And Paul tells us about Abraham, yet he did not waver through unbelief regarding the promise of God, but was strengthened in his faith and gave glory to God, being fully persuaded that God had the power to do what God had promised.

This is why it was credited to him as righteousness. So without having a law to follow, Abraham, just by believing that God would do what God had promised, was declared by God to be a righteous person.

In Romans chapter 4 verses 23 through 25, Paul asserts that people can become righteous in God's eyes apart from observing the law because the words it was credited to him were not written for him, for Abraham alone, but also for us, to whom God will credit righteousness, for us who believe in him who raised our Lord Jesus from the dead.

[29:22] He was delivered over to death for our sins and was raised to life for our justification. Wow.

You know, this understanding became very important to a woman named Lydia. Lydia had become a friend of Paul's when he met her one day by a river outside of Philippi.

Here's her story as told in the book of Acts. On the Sabbath, we went outside the city gate to the river where we expected to find a place of prayer.

We sat down and began to speak to the women who had gathered there. One of those listening was a woman named Lydia, a dealer in purple cloth from the city of Thyatira, who was a worshiper of God.

The Lord opened her heart to respond to Paul's message. When she and the members of her household were baptized, she invited us to come to her home.

[30:29] If you consider me a believer in the Lord, she said, come and stay at my house. And she persuaded us. Now, we don't know too much about this woman Lydia.

She was from Thyatira, which was a city in what is now Turkey. Thyatira was a center of trade. And among the different kinds of trade that were done in Thyatira, they were especially known for their trading in expensive, rare dyes, and cloth.

Purple cloth. Different shades of blues and deep reds. Beautiful cloth. And Lydia had become a successful merchant there, dealing in those dyes and fabrics.

It was the kind of cloth that was used for the garments for kings and emperors.

Wealthy and powerful people could afford clothing made of such fabrics. In the church, purple is also a symbolic color.

[31:59] Today we have green cloth dressing up our lectern, dressing up our communion table. But during times of the year when we're drawing special attention to something about Jesus' life, like during Advent, when we're looking forward to Christmas, the coming of Christ, or Lent, when we're looking forward to remembering the crucifixion and resurrection, we dress our church in purple because we know Jesus is our king.

He's our Lord. And we honor him with purple. The soldiers who were mocking Jesus at his crucifixion, remember what they dressed him in?

A crown made of thorns and a purple robe because he had been accused of claiming to be a king.

Lydia must have been a very successful woman. She must have had substantial means if she was able to maintain a household in Philippi so far away from her business source in Thyatira.

And she did travel back and forth. I think she must have come to a point in her life where she realized that the pagan religious practices of her hometown were somehow just not connecting her with God.

[33:37] The scripture tells us that she was a God worshiper. Now, if we just look at those words, that might mean to us anything. There were gods all over the place. So people regarded all kinds of different things and forces in nature as gods.

Right? But the word that's used here that we translate to mean God worshiper meant someone very special. It means that she had connected with some devout Jewish people and learned about the God that they worship, the one true God creator of all.

And she was learning to follow God as a Jewish woman. She probably hadn't come to the point where she had actually converted to Judaism yet, but she was working on it.

That meant that she had to learn to obey God's laws, and she was hoping to become justified by doing the works that the law required. When she met Paul and his missionary companions, the scripture says that God opened her heart to respond to Paul's message of justification by faith.

She learned that there was nothing she herself could do to be made righteous before God. She had to rely on God's grace and to have faith that Jesus had died to pay the penalty for her sin.

[35:12] And Jesus had overcome the sentence of death that sin deserves by his resurrection to eternal life. You know, God is not merely a merciful God who forgives our sins like they don't really matter.

God sometimes people regard God that way, especially in our culture. Wonderful, merciful Savior. He's our God. He loves us.

He does anything for us. I can pray for anything I want. God will grant it to me just because he's my friend. And God is our friend. And God is merciful and God is wonderful and loves us with an everlasting love.

love. But we can't just go to God and ask for forgiveness and God just kind of takes the attitude like, oh, yeah, fine, good, whatever, it's okay.

No harm done, no big deal. Sin is never okay. Sin is never okay.

[36:23] for God to be simply merciful would just not be right. It wouldn't be just. Our God is a God of justice as well as mercy.

Forgiveness and justification because of what Jesus did on the cross shows both mercy and justice. Justice because the punishment for sin was taken care of for all of us.

Mercy because it was God who was the one who did it for us. God in Jesus Christ who did the one thing that we could not do for ourselves.

As a woman of Jewish belief under the law, Lydia would have been trying to do something to earn righteousness. And I think she would have done her best, don't you? I mean, she was a very successful businesswoman in a world where business was dominated by men, in a world where she probably had to fight for everything she had and for the right to become the successful merchant that she was.

The type person who probably would have done a really good job and been very diligent about living according to the requirements of the law. But like us, she would never have been perfect.

[38:04] And by God's grace, she recognized that she needed to have faith in Jesus. I remember when I recognized that very thing in my own life.

as a young adult, late teens and getting into my early 20s, I saw so many injustices in the world, especially in the government, and it made me mad.

Does it make you mad? I wanted so badly to become part of the solution to those problems, and I was getting involved.

And one day, God spoke to me, and he said that there was nothing I could do. He said there was nothing I could do to truly change anything for good.

Unless I was on his team. Unless I started following the leading of the Holy Spirit and discovering what God wanted me to do and how God wanted me to do it, and then there would be a way for change to come.

[39:26] On that day, I truly believed God. I accepted by faith all that Jesus had done for me so that I could be free from my sin, and I allowed God to change my life so that I would be able to do good, not by my own power, but by God's empowerment for God, not for me.

And everything in my life changed. You know, I have trouble believing things just because somebody told me to believe them. Anybody like that in here? There's a lot of people out in the world, and a lot of people in the church, too, who believe whatever they hear.

they listen to this news station or that news station or this commentator or that guy down the street, and they hear something that seems to be right to them, and they just, without doing any kind of thinking for themselves, just go off and start spouting out what somebody else has said about how they should think.

But I have never been able to be like that. I don't know why. I cannot believe something just because somebody tells me. When I was finishing my undergrad degree, my natural sciences professor, he was kind of funny.

One day he looked at me as we were discussing something, and he said, why in the world would you want to be a pastor? He said, what makes you think that you would be a good pastor?

[41:01] You don't think like a theologian. You think like a scientist. And I guess in some ways that's true. I have to see proof of something.

I have to feel it. I have to know it. By having experienced it and by seeing it come to pass. I'm like the Berean believers, kind of, who are described in the book of Acts.

these people who are faithful followers of Jesus Christ, Paul writes, received the message with great eagerness and examined the scriptures every day to see if what Paul said was true.

They didn't believe him just because he was Paul. They went back to the scriptures he was preaching from and searched and learned. but I don't believe this book either.

Oh, it got real quiet in here. I don't believe this book simply based on the words that happen to be written on the page that I can read.

[42:19] I believe what this book says because I know the one who inspired every single word written in here. I believe in this book because I believe in the one who saw to it that this book would be assembled exactly as we needed it so that we could know God better.

I believe that I can learn from this book all about God because I believe in the one. I believe in the God who motivated and empowered the actions of every single man, woman, and child whose stories are in this book who acted according to faith and were righteous.

Because I know God through accepting Jesus Christ into my life as my Savior and Lord, the only Savior and Lord that they could ever possibly be, and by following the leading of the Holy Spirit in my life, I let Jesus be not only my Savior but my Lord.

When God revealed himself to me in Jesus Christ, I knew I had to drop the plans I had for my life and surrender to God's plan for me.

I believe that I am in right relationship with God, not because of anything I can do for myself but because of how God chooses to honor faith.

[44:00] And when I read this book, I believe God is teaching me more each day about what it means to fulfill God's law by loving God with all my heart, you know the rest, soul, mind, and strength and by loving my neighbor as myself.

Paul taught this message of justification by faith everywhere he went. We hear it again in a letter to a minister friend of his called Titus. He writes, we were once foolish, disobedient, deceived, and slaves to our desires and various pleasures too.

we were spending our lives in evil behavior and jealousy. We were disgusting and we hated other people.

But when God, our Savior's kindness and love appeared, he saved us because of his mercy, not because of righteous things we had done. He did it through the washing of new birth and the renewing by the Holy Spirit, which God poured out upon us generously through Jesus Christ, our Savior.

So since we have been made righteous by his grace, we can inherit the hope of eternal life. Do you have the hope of eternal life today?

[45:31] Okay? If you don't, have the assurance down in the depths of your soul that you are right with God, all you have to do is confess your sin and ask God to forgive you.

Then you ask Jesus to come into your heart, to come into your life and be your Lord and Savior. the Holy Spirit would lead you and guide you in all you do and God will answer you and God's answer will be yes!

Yes! Those of us who know in the depths of our being that our faith has been credited to us as righteousness, we need to confess as well.

Amen? Because none of us is yet at a place where we do this Christian discipleship thing perfectly. So let's pray together.

And after we've prayed, we're going to sing praise to God for all God has done for us in Jesus and for sending the Holy Spirit to comfort us and guide us through each day of our lives so we can be a blessing.

[46:58] Let's pray. Heavenly Father, I have sinned. I have not loved you with all my heart, soul, mind, and strength and I have not loved my neighbor as myself.

I have tried to do everything for myself. I have tried to save myself.

I have done things just to bring glory to me. Forgive me, Lord. Help me, Lord.

Teach me, Lord. Teach me, Lord. Let's take a moment and lift up silently in our hearts, those things that God reveals to us that need to be carried away and lifted off of us.

God, I'm sorry.

[48:27] God, I'm sorry. I'm sorry. And I ask you to come into my heart. and make me more like you. In Jesus' name I pray.

Amen. You need Jesus until today. And now you know you've been justified by faith, by faith in God and all that God has promised us.

Or even if you've been in church your whole life and you've known him and drawn on his power and walked in the path that he's called you to. If you have questions about your faith, if you feel like you need to know more, if you feel like you need to go deeper, and we all do, ask somebody.

Anybody you've seen ministering up here this morning, any of our folks who are CLMs, any of the folks who lead Bible studies and stuff, get with them.

Ask them. I'm not promising we're going to have all the answers, but we can at least point you in a good direction and we can pray with you. You can start yourself, too, by praying every day.

[49:55] if you're not praying every day, you need to be. God will speak to you. God will reveal all that God has for you and all that God wants for you.

Start by reading this book because you know the one who gave it to us. A gospel, that's a great place to start because the gospels are all about Jesus, who he was, who he is, what he did, what he's doing.

Mark is the shortest one. You can start there. It's okay. Or you want to really jump in with both feet and just dive in. There's the Bible challenge.

You can pick up sheets about that out there or you can get it off the website. Join us in studying the Bible and find a Christian friend to walk with.

[51:03] They don't have it. The world will pull us off course. Find a Christian friend to share with, to walk with.

Christians do these kinds of things to move forward in our faith and that's what we have to be doing. As we move forward in our faith, we're able to go out and help point other people to Jesus too.

God is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance. We want to be someone who points to righteousness.

We're going to come to the table now and boy, you can receive from God in a very special way when you come to the table. God is in the bread. God is in the juice.

And everyone is welcome. If you love God, earnestly repent of your sin and seek to live in peace with one another as disciples of Jesus Christ. You are welcome to come and receive from him.
