[13:18] Dear Heavenly Father, here we are this morning among our friends, among those who we love. We are privileged to be here together. May we remember that as we go through the week that not only you are with us, but our fellow Christians are with us.

We are with us in our concerns, our joys and our prayers. Heavenly Father, be with us, these families who are suffering loss, who are suffering disturbances in life.

Life goes along very smoothly. And then we hit a bump in the road sometimes. And you are the one that helps us get over that bump and go on to that smooth highway that we all enjoy.

Be with our church. Be with our volunteers. Be with our staff. Prayers are needed every day for all of us.

We especially ask for your love and your guidance on all the victims of this horrible hurricane. Thousands of people have been displaced. Homes are shattered.

[14:56] I cannot imagine what that must be like. We pray for them that somewhere amidst all the rubble they may find a bit of peace. A peace that can only come from you.

Lord, as we go through our work days, let's be kind to others. Let us be patient. Sometimes patience is the greatest challenge to overcome.

But when we do, we pray for them. Be with our young people. Be with our young people as they struggle and strive through school.

All these wonderful things you give us. We are so grateful. We cannot express that gratefulness in words. So let us do it in our hearts. And let that Holy Spirit come into us and reach out to others.

In your holy name we pray. Amen. We will now have our scripture reading. Good morning. Today's scripture is from the book of James, chapter 1, verses 19 through 27.

[16:47] My dear brothers, take note of this. Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to become angry. For man's anger does not bring about the righteous life that God desires.

Therefore, get rid of all moral filth and the evil that is so prevalent, and humbly accept the word planted you, which can save you. Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says.

Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like a man who looks at his face in the mirror, and after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like.

But the man who looks intently into the perfect law that gives freedom, and continues to do this, not forgetting what he has heard, but doing it, he will be blessed in what he does.

If anyone considers himself religious, and yet does not keep a tight rein on his tongue, he deceives himself, and his religion is worthless. Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this.

[17:51] To look after orphans and widows in their distress, and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world. This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God. Thank you, Lynn, for sharing the scripture with us today.

For those of you who don't know me, I'm Pastor Jean, and usually I'm down at our church in Niagara Falls on Sunday mornings preaching, and so it's a real gift to be able to come here and be with all of you today.

I hope that if I don't know you, that you'll stop by and introduce yourself to me as we go through the morning. You know, we're continuing on with our sermon series on the seven deadly sins.

We'll also be looking at that old TV show, Gilligan's Island, because the characters on that show each represented one of the seven deadly sins. Now, Pastor Tom is on vacation this week, and I have to say, he has impeccable timing, leaving me with the subject of lust.

Now, parents, I'm going to warn you. I'm going to try to keep it PG-rated, but we may be talking about some things that will raise tricky questions for you.

[19:06] However, I hope that you will see these as a launching pad for holding some of those important discussions that we need to have with our children and our youth.

Besides, if we don't talk about these things in the setting of the church, where will our young people learn about them? We certainly don't want them to learn about it at school or in the mall, and heaven forbid that they learn about it on the internet, right?

So I want our kids to have a godly understanding, something that comes right from God's word, not the world's viewpoint on lust.

So there you have my warning. If you feel as though you have to take children or youth out, I understand, but I hope that you'll stay. So what is lust? I would say that lust is any desire or passion that we have for something or for someone that becomes obsessive and out of control.

Lust is a deadly sin because it can replace God as the object of our desire. And any time that happens, we're in dangerous trouble.

[20:23] It can be, but it's not always related to uncontrolled sexual desire. But let's be honest about it, though. When you hear the word lust, isn't that right where your mind goes?

Yes. Yes. We think especially of young men who have all those hormones raging, and it's hard for them to keep everything under control.

But it can also affect women, men and women of all different ages. There's nothing really wrong with physical desire for one another, for men and women.

It's actually a natural desire that God has planted inside of us so that we'll be attracted to one another. It brings two human beings together. And it's a wonderful feeling when our hearts are all on Twitter, isn't it?

But God has given us this physical desire for a very sacred purpose. It's meant to bind the relationship of a husband and wife together.

[21:25] It's meant to strengthen their marriage and increase the love that they have for one another. And it also allows us to perpetuate the human race by producing children in a stable home.

Scripture says that when a man and woman are married, the two become one flesh. But like any other good gift from God, we can take that gift, that physical intimacy, and it can be twisted and it can be abused.

The problem of lust arises when our physical desire begins to take over and rule our life. It becomes a sin. We act upon our desire without stopping to think about the real God-given purpose of it and without considering the long-term consequences our actions could have on others.

Everything we do, everything we do affects someone else. Whether we do it behind closed doors or not, it still is going to affect the other people in our lives.

Lust is especially sinful when it takes advantage of vulnerable people, whether it's children or even disadvantaged adults.

[22:43] That is why James writes in verse 27, to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world.

Our world is inundated by inappropriate sexuality. Everywhere you look, you see it. TV shows, movies, books, fashions, the internet, advertising.

You know, companies can't even sell candy without making it look like a highly sensual thing just to eat chocolate. We're supposed to keep ourselves pure from being polluted by such images and such thoughts.

The thing about sexual lust that makes it wrong is that it disrespects the person it's directed towards. It takes away their personhood, their individuality, their value in the eyes of God.

Lust is sometimes confused with another four-letter word. I wonder if you know it. Love, L-O-V-E, love, exactly. And there's a lot of difference between the two.

[24:03] Lust is self-centered and love is other-centered. In other words, lust thinks about what pleasure or power can I get out of our relationship while love is focused on sacrificing my needs for the good of the other person.

It's just this way that Jesus demonstrated love to us, didn't he? Jesus demonstrated real love by sacrificing his life for us.

Too often these days, I think that physical intimacy is becoming a substitute for real deep emotional intimacy. In fact, it seems as though sex has become a casual sport in some circles.

You know, two people can be physically intimate for years without really getting to know each other on a deep level. Here's a note that a young woman wrote to an advice column not too long ago.

She wrote, Dear Abby, I am a 23-year-old liberated woman who has been on the pill for two years. It's getting expensive, and I think my boyfriend should share half the cost, but I don't know him well enough to discuss money with him.

[25:18] Really? What is wrong with this picture? Can you know someone well enough to sleep with them but not know them well enough to talk about money with them?

It doesn't make sense to me. And this young woman's note would really be funny if it wasn't such a sad statement of her own poor self-worth.

And it's also a statement about the worsening decay of our moral fabric in this society. Am I just old-fashioned?

I don't think so. When I look to the scriptures, I see the writings of Paul in 1 Corinthians 6 and 7, where he advised people to stay single if they could, so that they would remain pure and could concentrate on serving the Lord.

But he also said if a couple is burning with passion for each other, they should get married so that they wouldn't fall into sexual immorality. That just makes sense.

[26:22] We're supposed to remain celibate in singleness and save ourselves for marriage because in the act of physical intimacy, two become one.

You can't become one with several different partners before or even after marriage and still have the right kind of relationship with your spouse.

The flesh, the heart, the mind, the soul, it all becomes involved and it becomes confused by too many partners. And so people, God's word is, save it for the real deal.

Save it till you're with a partner that you want to be with for life. When James wrote his letter to the early Christian believers, they were surrounded by pagan religions.

And among those religions were various forms of idol worship, which was something that God really, really detests. People were worshiping man-made statues that represented the forces of nature.

[27:29] There were gods of the sea and the sun and the moon and the stars. There were gods that people thought could affect their success in war or could make their crops grow or could help their families to be fertile and produce lots of children.

And when we look at it now, it just seems ridiculous to us, doesn't it, that a statue made out of metal or stone or wood could actually have any effect at all on nature, much less the God of the universe.

And a lot of these pagan religions practice rituals that we would consider strange, at least, and even immoral. Some of them sacrificed the lives of their children to the idols as a sign of their devotion.

And many encouraged both men and women to have physical relations with temple prostitutes because the people thought it would help them to improve their own fertility, their own strength, and that it would somehow please these little gods.

Idol worship was all about manipulating the natural forces and the people in our lives in order that the worshiper could gain something for themselves.

[28:43] What happens when we try to manipulate forces and people in our world? We're trying to gain control, control over our lives, and the only one who really has control over our lives is God.

And so when we worship idols, we're putting ourselves in the place of God. No wonder God hates idol worship. Idol worship plays upon our natural desires, makes us think that we should be able to satisfy any want, any need, any desire in any way that makes us feel good.

And so we can try to use our desires to manipulate others for our own satisfaction and gain. Do we see that in our culture today? Yes. Yes, we do.

Both men and women use physical desire as a means of manipulating other people. We play upon someone's lust and try to use it to our advantage.

Can you think of somebody from Gilligan's Island who did that? How about Ginger? Ginger, I think the plan is impossible. Why?

[29:55] A girl can get a man to do all kinds of things for her. I know, but robots aren't human. Neither are some of the guys I went out with. The professor says that robots can't do any original thinking, no matter how you ask them.

Well, that's what makes it a challenge. See you later. High and tall, dark and mechanical.

I do not understand. I'll make it a little clearer for you. You see, I've been stuck on this island for a long, long time. Understand?

I understand. And I want you to get me off. I am not programmed for that task. Well, uh, gee whiz.

Can't you put your mind to it? I mean, concentrate for Ginger, can you? Just think of what it would mean for me to be back in Hollywood. I'll tell you what.

[30:57] If you get me back to Hollywood, I'll introduce you to the swingin'est lady robot you ever saw. For Ginger? Huh? Come on. Please?

Now you're goin'. I think you're beginning to register. Of course, it seems silly to us that Ginger could manipulate a robot in that way.

I mean, you have to think about what she brought in her little travel bag for this three-hour tour. She probably had her bag of makeup, right? And she had, um, oh, some perfume.

You saw her spritz her perfume on, right? And maybe she had some long, dangly earrings, because those are sexy, right? And then, of course, she had several dresses in her bag.

Nah, that one doesn't work. How about, how about, yeah, this one. This one, I think this one will work. Ha ha ha. Woo! Ha ha ha. Ha ha ha. Ha ha ha. Well, it's silly to think about her bringing those things along, and it's silly to think about her trying to manipulate a robot.

[32:02] How could she have any effect upon him? But every woman out there understands what Ginger was trying to do. She was flirting with the robot to get her own way, and we've all done it, haven't we, ladies?

You know, you bat your eyes, and you tilt your head, and you dress provocatively, and you appeal to the big, strong man in him and say, oh, please, help me, sir.

We know we're trying to incite their lust to get our way. We know it, and the men know it, too, and the men do it to us as well. Don't you? Yes.

We try to say it's innocent flirting, but even innocent flirting can get out of control, especially when it disrespects the human dignity of another person.

Of course, that's what makes the video so humorous. We know Ginger's charms couldn't really work on a robot because he isn't human. But we are human beings, and we do have real physical desires.

[33:07] How do we control those desires? How do we learn to use them in a healthy way? Well, I would suggest that we look at the Word of God. James says in verse 21, The Word of God tells us to make ourselves holy and pure, to reclaim that image of God in which we were made.

And the only way we can do that is to receive the transforming of grace through faith in Jesus Christ. It's not always an easy thing, but with the power of the Holy Spirit, we can exercise self-control.

One of the fruit of the Spirit mentioned in Galatians 5. Do you remember them? Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

We always balk at that one, don't we? But these fruit are the virtues which counteract the seven deadly sins that we've been talking about in this sermon series.

Self-control and genuine love. These are the ones that counteract the sin of lust. When we fill our lives with God's Word by reading it and studying it regularly, we begin to experience the fruit of the Spirit more and more in our lives.

[34:43] And while coming to worship and hearing sermons is also good, if we don't take that back out into the world with us, it doesn't do any good at all.

James goes on to say in verse 22, Do not merely listen to the Word and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says. Some people who come to worship every week can be like students who go to a college in order to audit a class.

They don't want to do the work that's involved in earning real credits. So they'll take advantage of the privilege of hearing a good teacher, but they don't want to do the homework.

And they sure don't want to write a thesis. And they certainly don't want to take a test and maybe fail. So some people are like that when they come to worship and they listen, but that's as far as it goes.

When they walk out the door of the church and back into the world, they continue to act as if they have never heard the Word of God. Their lives go on being controlled by the lust of this world, the overpowering desire for physical pleasure, or for power, or for anything else that might fill up the loneliness and the ineffectiveness that we all feel inside of us at times.

[36:03] There's only one who can fulfill those deep longings, and that one is God. What else does Scripture tell us about our relationship with God and how we're expected to live?

In 1 Thessalonians chapter 4, it says, It is God's will that you should be sanctified, that you should avoid sexual immorality, that each of you should learn to control your own body in a way that is holy and honorable, not in passionate lust like the pagans who do not know God, and that in this matter no one should wrong or take advantage of a brother or sister.

The Lord will punish all those who commit such sins, as we told you and warned you before. For God did not call us to be impure, but to live a holy life.

Therefore, anyone who rejects this instruction does not reject a human being, but God, the very God who gives you his Holy Spirit.

Pretty strong language, right? But God doesn't waver on his requirements. We are called to be pure and holy. We are called not only to listen to the word of God, but also to go out and do it every single day.

[37:23] And it's not just our action, but also our thoughts that can get us into trouble. Do you remember what Jesus told his disciples when he was talking to them about adultery?

In Matthew 5, he said, You have heard that it was said, You shall not commit adultery, but I tell you, anyone who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery with her in his heart.

Why is adultery so wrong? Because it disrespects the relationship we have with our spouse. Why is lust so wrong? Because it disrespects another person and misuses the natural gifts of God, whether it's for sexual intimacy or for the natural power that we have over others who are smaller and weaker than us.

Lust is about using another person, and that's just wrong. So, every time a thought like that, an impure thought, pops into our heads, or a lustful desire begins to overtake us, we need to get rid of it.

And the best way to do that is to fill up our hearts and fill up our minds with God's holy scripture. These are words that have been preserved for us down through the ages.

[38:47] They're not just old words written in a dusty book. They're words that have meaning and give us hope and give us strength and give us life. These are holy words that can change us forever by teaching us to resist the deadly sin of lust, teaching us the right way to love and to have self-control, to love God and to love each other.

And so this morning, I'd like to invite you to stand and sing with us ancient ornaries. holy words, long preserved for our walk in this world.

They resound with thoughts of God, oh, let the ancient words impart. words of life, words of hope, give us strength, help us hope.

In this world, where'er we roam, ancient words will guide us home. ancient words, ever true, changing me and changing you.

We have come with open hearts, oh, let the ancient words impart. holy words of our faith, handed down to this age, came to us through sacrifice, the weak of faithful words of Christ.

[40:52] of Christ. holy words, long preserved, for our walk, in this world. They resound with thoughts of God, oh, let the ancient words stand in for.

ancient words, ever true, changing me and changing you.

We have come with open hearts, oh, let the ancient words impart. ancient words, ever true, changing me and changing you.

We have come with open hearts, oh, let the ancient words impart. God purifies us sometimes by putting us through the fire.

purify my heart, let me be as gold and precious silver, purify my heart, let me be as gold.

[42:38] pure gold, refined as fire. my heart's one desire is to be holy, set apart for you, Lord, I choose to be holy, set apart for you, my master, ready to do your grace.

pure gold, pure gold, purify my heart, and speak from within, and make me holy.

[50:25] And so with your people on earth and all the company of heaven, we praise your name and join their unending hymn. Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory.

Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest. Holy are you and blessed is your son, Jesus Christ.

Your spirit anointed him to preach good news to the poor, to proclaim release to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, and to announce that the time had come when you would save your people.

He healed the sick, fed the hungry, and ate with sinners. By the baptism of his suffering, death, and resurrection, you gave birth to your church, delivered us from slavery to sin and death, and made with us a new covenant by water and the Spirit.

When the Lord Jesus ascended, he promised to be with us always in the power of your word and your Holy Spirit. On the night in which he gave himself up for us, he took bread, and he gave thanks to you, and he broke the bread, and he gave it to his disciples, and he said, Take and eat.
