## **All Saints' Day**

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## Date: 07 November 2021

## Preacher: Pastor Cathy Hall Stengel

[0:00] Good morning. It's a beautiful day in the neighborhood. A little cool, but so how about we start with the peace of Christ be with you?

So if you will keep it reasonable, you can greet people around you. But we don't want to be donging people back to attention. So just say good morning or wave or whatever you want to do, but go for it.

All right, good job.

You know, as soon as we kick these variants out of the universe, then we'll be still saying, not too long. For those of you who don't know me or for those of you who are watching online, I'm Kathy Stengel, one of the pastors.

And today is the day that we are celebrating All Saints Day. That is why the pastoral team is robed out of respect and honor for those who have gone before us.

[1:13] But let me think about this. Does being a saint in our lives require that a person has died? Did I hear a no?

So then the question would be, well, what's the job description of a saint? How do you know? What makes a person a saint? Christ-like?

Forgiving or forgiven? You know, sometimes I think about what and who some of the saints are in my life.

And I think about the fact that in the season almost 40 years ago, when my mother made this robe, every stitch of it, every button, she didn't even know what ordination was.

She didn't have a church connection. She believed in God with her whole heart, but she didn't really understand. Well, maybe neither did I, really.

[2:24] She didn't even get to come to the ordination. But when I put this on, and there's been years when it fit and years when it didn't.

Because back then there were no women's robes. The robes that we had available to us were academic, the kind of robes that do this.

I didn't want one. I got enough of that. But the prayer and the love and the hopes that she sewed into every stitch of this makes her a saint to me.

And her name won't be read because she died a long time ago, but she's still a saint in my life. And there are saints in your lives who maybe are still with us.

Thank you, God. For those saints who live among us, may they continue to move and live and be saints to yet maybe another generation of people who are looking for people who are solid and loving and who will walk with them even for just a little piece of their lives.

[3:42] Those are the people that we have gathered here because we are all either already saints or saints in the making. So with that, let's celebrate.

Good morning, church family. For those of you that don't know me, I am Steve Sosnowski, and my family consists of my wife, Kimberly, and my daughter, Caitlin. I was asked the question, why is PCUMC a part of my life, and are there saints of the church that have inspired me?

When I came to Pendleton Center, I had been married for 13 years, and I had not been a member of any church since I was living in my parents' house as a teenager. My wife and I came from different denominations, and we both had a great desire to worship together as we were expecting a child and felt we needed to ensure a proper faith base for her, the same as we had both had in our lives.

Some friends told us about PCUMC, and they were children-friendly, and that we should check it out. My first experience was met by Peter standing at the door welcoming us, and by the time all the children had returned to their parents from Sunday school, and we heard, I don't care if this is your first time or if you are a member of this church, all are welcome at the table for communion, and ending with, my dear departed friend Jim, God rest his soul, seeing that we were new faces and asked, where have you been all this time?

We knew that we found our faith community. Our entry into ministry started with my wife joining the finance team, and Jim talking me into the men's breakfast, because, you know, who could say no to Jim?

[5:32] And before you knew it, I was cleaning up after fish fries and with my daughter, and contributing wherever I could. My daughter immediately got involved with Hot Chocolate with God, and has progressed into a youth leader that helps with pretty much anything Miss Adrienne asked her to do.

I was asked to become a trustee a few years ago, and after much prayer and consideration, felt this is where I should use whatever talents I have, which are suspect at best.

I can tell you beyond a shadow of a doubt, my family and I have had our faith nourished, which has enabled us to have the capacity to give of our time and our talents to help our church, and in turn, help others.

My wife and I have said so many times as we were driving back and forth to trunk or treat, or to cleaning up from fish fries, or just returning from service after dropping Caitlin off for a youth meeting, that this was time well spent.

This was a good use of the time we had available in the day and in the week. There are many who have inspired me in this journey, but there is one standout for me, and that is Mr. Rich Henderson, who is probably cringing right now at the mere mention of his name, but as a longtime usher and chairman of the trustees, Mr. Henderson has quietly taken care of this facility, its membership, without ever looking for a minute of praise for any of his accomplishments.

Rich has recently retired as our trustee chair, so please stop telling him about all the things that he needs to do, and can only say, these are shoes that just cannot be filled.

You are faithful with a few things, and I will put you in charge of many things. Enter the joy of your master. Rich, you gave of your talents and multiplied what you were given by giving and inspiring others to be better by your example.

I can only hope when my time has passed, I will have done the same for someone to carry on in this ministry in the same way and in the name of our Lord. I would also like to express my gratitude to Sam Folby, who has also recently retired and also fits that same mold.

You know, Kelly's always done the choir for the last 20 years or 18 years. And for me, that meant, you know, moving chairs and getting donuts and doing all the fun things that came along with that.

But the reality is I was involved. And I think as we look, whether it was Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts, I see you out there, Phil Bova. It's just been a great thing for our family.

And the last thing that Pastor Kathy asked us to speak about is all the people that have influenced us and been mentors of the faith over the years.

[30:00] And we struggled with that because there's so many of you, many of you probably sitting in the sanctuary when this video airs. And we would probably be remiss and not remember everybody to thank and talk about those who've gone before.

> But there is one person that I think kind of epitomizes just the personality of our church. When Dan and I were new members, I had the chance to speak to Olive Burbage.

> And I hope she's here when we're showing this video on this Sunday morning. But she told me about why she's been coming to church and why it's so important to her.

And the thing that I remembered most was that she talked to me about how she greets people when they come to our church. Even though she's been there for so, so many years, when she sees somebody new or somebody who hasn't been there in a while, she said, I just like to say hello, welcome, and we're glad you're here.

I don't say to them, why haven't you been here for a month? Or how come I haven't seen you since last summer? In her own sweet way, she just says, we're glad that you've joined us.

[31:11] Welcome, and I hope to see you again next Sunday. And that just really stuck with me over the years. So she is one of many saints who have mentored us and influenced us.

And we love them all. We love Pendleton Center. And we're so thankful for this church and this congregation. Thanks, everybody. Thanks, everybody. Thank you.

I'm going to start reading this. I have to say that I second the motion from Kelly and Dan about Ollie. She's been so much a part of Chet's in my life.

She's been instrumental in keeping our faith going, and we love her. Today's reading is from the Gospel of Mark, chapter 12, verses 38 through 44.

As he was teaching, he said, watch out for the legal experts. They like to walk around in long robes. They want to be greeted with honor in the markets.

[32:51] They long for places of honor in the synagogues and at banquets. They are the ones who cheat widows out of their homes and to show off they say long prayers.

They will be judged most harshly. Jesus sat across from the collection box for the temple treasury and observed how the crowd gave their money.

Many rich people were throwing in lots of money. One poor widow came forward and put two small copper coins worth a penny.

Jesus called his disciples to him and said, I assure you that this poor widow has put in more than everyone who's been putting money in the treasury.

All of them are giving out of their spare change. But she, from her hopeless poverty, has given everything she had, even what she needed to live on.

[33:48] This is the word of our Lord. Thanks be to God. Thank you, Carol. It is a day and a time to think about those who were a part of getting us to where we are.

And on some days, there might be a sense when you're asked that question and you look around and you're like, yeah, look where I am. Because maybe you're not as happy with where you are as where you would like to be.

But the reality is, is that we always have with us and among us the people who have inspired us. The people who have helped us to get up in the morning and face another day, whether it's truly facing another day or whether it is coming with thanks and joy into a day that the Lord has given us.

What is the importance? In the Catholic Church, there's an understanding of saints that is very different from the Protestant Church. The good news is we get to give anybody saint status.

They don't have to go through a process. But on the other hand, there will never probably be a statue. And we come to this place and we look at this scripture and, yes, I'm wearing a long robe.

[35:20] But I'm not one of the people that Jesus is talking about. And as we are in this place, in this time, in the year, as the year is unfolding and we're coming, take a deep breath towards the end of the year.

And as we are in this place, it's a chance to reflect and say, where am I? Who am I? And what am I doing with my life, with my gifts, with my talents, with my family, if I have one?

And we think about this widow who was very likely someone who was loved and well cared for by a husband and possibly a family.

Who finds herself in this chapter of life. And maybe you've heard this before, but widows in the time of Jesus had no status.

It just didn't mean that they had a bad status. They just had no status. They were without a place to live. Because when their husband died, then the husband's home would go to his family.

[36:31] And the widow would then live with children or relatives, whoever would take them in. So is the lesson with this widow about emptying your pockets, giving all that you have, even that which you need to live on?

Or is it a passage that is about Jesus seeing a woman? She wasn't parading in front of everybody.

If he hadn't been sitting where he was, he wouldn't have known what she put in to the offering. But he saw her. And throughout scripture, one of the things we notice is that there are times when Jesus sees someone that nobody else sees.

Jesus sees the person with leprosy, the prostitute, the person who's been waiting for years and years to get taken into the pool for healing.

Jesus sees those who are wondering. And he often speaks with them. The woman at the well.

[37:47] Culture and society would have said, oh no, you don't go there talking to that woman. She's one of those women. Jesus saw her, sat with her, spoke with her, forgave her.

Jesus saw the widow who had with her husband going lost so much of what she had. Jesus sees us.

So often people go through this life and they're not seen. They sort of come through and go and don't make a fuss and don't draw attention to themselves and therefore are sometimes not seen.

What's happening in their lives is sometimes not seen. And you think, Jesus, he knew she was a widow because he said so.

He said that she brought these two coins that were what she would use to pay for her life, the rent, the whatever it is that she's paying for food.

[38:53] He didn't just see her. He didn't just visually see her. He knew her. When we journey through this life, we're so many phases.

We have children. We have teenagers, young adults, the great middle, and then people who are in the experienced generation.

Just leave it with that. And we think about how do we both honor and look at the saints in our lives and hold them with esteem.

One of the things that if you hear me preach at a funeral or memorial service, one of the things that you'll hear me say is that while God has brought into his arms and keeping the one who has gone before us, what about the rest of us?

What about the ones who are still living? And there's a couple of things. One is we keep telling the stories. That's what I shared with my daughter and her family.

[40:14] Keep telling the stories because these little boys might not remember. So keep telling them the stories of their grandfather. Keep telling the fishing and building and fixing and all of those kinds of things.

That's how we keep a person alive. Walk with others the way you have been walked. You look at the saints in your life.

What did you learn from them? What have you learned from those who have gone before you? Was the way that they lived a way that you maybe when they died you thought, I wish I was more like?

Or they would be so glad if I did what? How is it that we carry on the work of the saints?

I recently had the opportunity to be with a family when someone who'd reached the wonderful age of 94 was facing the end of her life.

[41:22] And she was in the Alzheimer's unit in a nursing home. She didn't necessarily recognize or know people. But still we gathered.

We were sitting vigil because we felt like her life on this earth would end soon. So there was talking and storytelling. Some of the things that during COVID we would have done anything to have because that's what you do.

And it got long. So pretty soon they started singing. They started singing like Jesus Loves Me, Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star.

You know, just songs that the children were picking. And then somebody, one of her sons, wandered to the activity room and brought back song books. And then pretty soon we're singing Amazing Grace and How Great Thou Art and Nearer My God to Thee.

And we watched as this 94-year-old, her breathing calmed. She rested peacefully in her bed. But as you heard, it was all the generations.

[42:29] How does a child learn that faith is comforting? They learn it by not being taught it but by experiencing it.

How does a child learn about mission? It's because they see people do it. They see people and they wonder. If mom's baking, is there something going on at church?

Are you taking that to the church? Or if a man is baking? It just happens a man in my life doesn't bake. Or if they see, you know, extra boxes of macaroni and cheese and hamburger helper or whatever the case might be, they just assume that that's going to church.

And then they're like, yeah, it's not for us. No, not for you. But how does a person learn how to serve, how to give?

That, you know, when I was a child and we were sent down to the church in the little, little town and my parents gave us a quarter to put in the offering plate. How do children learn that part of what we're called to do is give?

[43:44] By seeing it. And they might not see their parents. They might see one of you, one of the adopted grandparents, one of the adopted important people in their life.

They may see you put a prayer request or an envelope in those boxes. They might see you with an Operation Christmas Child box and they learn to know what that is for.

They might see you. You might tell them, I'm going to a trustees meeting or a finance meeting. Now, those are not the only ways that people do things.

It just happens that we've heard about the choir, about finance, Boy Scouts, trustees and things like that. And we've heard about some of the heroes of our faith. God never called us to give our last two coins that add up to be a penny that's even what we need to live on.

Jesus called the young man to give everything that he had, sell it and give the money to the poor. Why? Because Jesus knew he couldn't do it. And Jesus wasn't going to take with him on a journey someone who was going to get three miles down the road and decide it was too hard and go back.

[45:09] It's not about emptying your bank account. It is about giving. But it's all of us. It's our gifts, our talents, our ties, our service, our mission and our witness.

And the church and the missions that we support depend on us. So I think about the stable growing over here, the manger, developing around here with the boxes.

I think about soon in a number of weeks the angel tree gifts will be all in the back and people will be going back and forth and putting this here and there and doing all of those things.

I think about our staff and our church being supported by who you are, by your prayers, by your presence here and by how you decide not the how you're going to be a saint because I don't think people are born thinking, you know, I want to be a saint at church.

Someday I want them to light a candle for me. We just learn how to grow up from the people around us. You are the people around us. You teach and inspire me and the rest of the pastors and the staff.

[46:31] May we do so with each other. And may we recognize that our lives, even in their brokenness, are lives of abundance, lives of faith and lives of thanksgiving.

And may we recognize that our lives are living in our lives. My prayer and my hope is that we will live that way. That those will be the ways that people look at our lives.

Not like Christian, Christian, Christian, Christian, Christian. Just by doing what it means to be a person of faith. And that's going to be different for you than for me.

And different for you than the person sitting next to you. And different for you than someone who's in junior church. Not all the same. We don't all pray the same.

We sure don't all look the same. We don't all do the same work. Some make pies. Some help with children. Some do boxes. Some go to Bible study.

[47:36] God says, this is what I have created. And this foundation, this very floor upon which we stand, has been built by those who have gone before us.
