The scripture today is taken from the Gospel of John, chapter 9, verses 1 through 16. As he went along, he saw a man blind from birth.

His disciples asked him, Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind? Neither this man nor his parents sinned, said Jesus, but this happened so that the works of God might be displayed in him.

As long as it is day, we must do the works of him who sent me. Night is coming when no one can work. While I am in the world, I am the light of the world.

[22:23] After saying this, he spit on the ground, made some mud with the saliva, and put it on the man's eyes. Go, he told him, wash in the pool of Siloam, which means sent.

So the man went and washed, and he came home seeing. His neighbors and those who had formerly seen him begging asked, Isn't this the same man who used to sit and beg?

Some claimed that he was. Others said, No, he only looks like him. But he himself insisted, I am the man. How then were your eyes opened?

They asked. He replied, The man they called Jesus made some mud and put it on my eyes. He told me to go to Siloam and wash. So I went and washed, and then I could see.

Where is this man? They asked him. I don't know, he said. They brought to the Pharisees the man who had been blind. Now the day in which Jesus had made the mud and opened the man's eyes was a Sabbath.

[23:23] Therefore the Pharisees also asked him how he had received his sight. He put mud on my eyes, the man replied, and I washed, and now I see. Some of the Pharisees said, This man is not from God, for he does not keep the Sabbath.

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God. Thank you, Pastor Sherry. As we look at these stories about Jesus, as he's walking towards the cross, he's meeting different people.

And in the process, he shows us how to love the way Jesus loved. And today he's coming upon a blind man who's sitting by the row with a bandage wrapped around his eyes and a stick and a cup so he can beg for a living.

And he says in this passage something a little disturbing. In verse 3, he says, This man is blind so that the works of God might be displayed in him.

His purpose is for God to display his works in him. Which is a little troubling to think that he was made blind from birth, seemingly on purpose.

[24:37] And we all have a purpose. Some of the purposes are easy to understand. Some of the purposes are amazing. And some of the gifts that God gives us are astounding. And each one has some particular gift.

The book of Romans in chapter 12 says, In Christ, we though many form one body. And each member belongs to all the others. We have different gifts according to the grace given to each of us.

And some of the gifts are simple and easy to see. And others, we have to look a little closer to discern what they are. Now this clip is pretty old. Many of you may have seen this.

This is from Britain's Got Talent. But I love this and wanted to share it with you if you haven't seen it. Hi, what's your name, darling?

My name is Susan Boyle. Okay, Susan, where are you from? I am from Blackburn near Bathgate, West Lothian. That's a big... Thanks, Susan. ...

[25:34] γ Okay, big song.

Yeah? Yes. You didn't expect that, did you?

Did you? No. Didn't expect that, did you? No, I didn't expect it either.

Some people, we just by their appearance assume, we assume that they're not gifted or that there's something about them that, and then they do amazing things.

And we see the gifting of God. What about people who not only don't seem amazing, but their gifts aren't quite so apparent?

Did God make this person blind on purpose? Does God make people broken or short of what we call normal or what we might consider to be whole intentionally?

In the book of Psalms, it says, you created my inmost beings. You knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made.

Your works are wonderful, and I know that full well. God made each of us the way he intended and said, this is very good.

[28:05] I can use this. So what does that mean when people are made blind? Or something about their body doesn't work, or what if they're made bipolar or schizophrenic, or their mental capacity isn't what we would consider to be at the normal level?

What does that mean? God made them that way. God designed them for a purpose that way and said, this is very good.

I'm pleased with this. God made this man blind so that the miracles, the power of God could be displayed, and so that his life would point to God.

Because that's the purpose of life. You've seen this passage for moments before. We know that in all things, all things, everything, all things, God works for good of those who love him and have been called according to his purpose.

So people that we might see as not quite measuring what our culture calls acceptable.

[29:27] God has made for a purpose. And maybe even in part, so that we will understand what love is.

Boy, that seems unfair, doesn't it? It seems unfair to believe that God made people with those kind of what we would call deficiencies. But you see, there's the whole piece of it.

We see them as deficiencies. God sees it as good. Very good. Amazing. It's not God that has a problem. It's not even the people themselves that has the problem.

It's us. We have the problem because if people don't act and look and seem the way we want, we struggle with it.

So the disciples said, who's sinned? Who messed up? This guy or his parents?

Don't you notice how we love to blame somebody? He must have something wrong with him. He must have done something wrong. That's why he's got a problem. Or his parents, because it's easy to blame the parents. All you parents understand that.

It's all your fault if your kids have a problem, right? Yeah. You know? All you got to do is watch Disney now and you'll find that all of you parents don't know anything anymore. Right? Father knows best is gone.

It's difficult to push those prejudices aside and realize that maybe, maybe, this is in God's plan too.

When I first went to be ordained as a United Methodist pastor, I went before this committee. And as I was sitting there in the group and waiting for the answer, they told me. no.

No. We won't ordain you as a pastor. And so I asked the natural question, well, why? They said, we looked at your grades and we looked at your paper and decided it wasn't good enough for the grades you had.

[31:31] I said, so let me get this straight. If I had poor grades, you would have approved me. Yeah. Wait a minute. I'm missing something. So the paper was acceptable. Accepting that my grades, I'm missing something here.

So you turned me down. Why? I struggled with that. And I had somebody ask me the year later when I went. And they said, you know, did the committee make the right decision? I said, absolutely not. Absolutely not.

That was ridiculous. I said, but God made the right decision. Because throughout a large part of my life, whatever I put my hand to succeeded.

And I needed to understand that some people who are good, some people who have done nothing wrong, some people who are trying their hardest fall flat on their face in the mud. And that doesn't mean it's their fault.

It doesn't mean we have to blame them or call them losers or decide there's something wrong with them. Good people struggle. All of us do. It's not this man's fault, Jesus said.

[32:37] People sin in a general sense. And that is called the brokenness of our world. And so we have pain. We have suffering. We have diseases. We have all this. Because we took a good creation and made it bad through our sin.

But that's a general condition we all struggle with. It's not specifically designed for one person. We look forward to the day when we'll go to glory through grace of God and his forgiving love.

And then we won't deal with these issues. But right now, it's part of the condition we all face. But not a specific issue. God says we need to learn to love like Jesus loved.

To open our eyes to the gift that everyone brings. Even the ones that are hard to discern. That we can't appreciate. Because they don't fit in the box that we've created as a culture.

Love as Jesus loved. Love people. Love people. Even if it's difficult. Even if it comes with a cost.

[33:45] Sometimes wonder if God just made people with deficiencies. To see if we'd love each other. In fact, it says that all of us have a gift of some sort.

But what it doesn't say is all of us are missing something. All of us have something wrong. We just, some of us hide it better than others. Jesus sees the man.

It's kind of fascinating, right? He's walking along. Disciples don't even notice him. Nobody notices this guy, right? But Jesus sees the man. And that's when the disciples saw him. Have you ever walked by somebody and just not even seen that they're there?

We do it a lot, don't we? We walk by people in the church and don't notice that they're there. We walk by people in the streets and we don't see that they're there. We walk by in the malls.

We don't even notice those people. They don't exist. Jesus saw this man. Now let me tell you, if you see a pretty person, a happy person, a wealthy person, a charming person, a normal person, we all want to be around them.

They make us feel like we're brought up by their very presence. But what if there's something a little kind of off? It's almost Easter, so we're going to get out the Easter bunnies.

What does an Easter bunny look like? When you think of a bunny, isn't this what you picture? Right? We've been watching a little movie called The Secret Life of Pets.

And this week, instead of a dog, we're going to look at a bunny. Don't you worry, Viper.

You will not be forgotten. You will be avenged, Viper. And if you don't believe me, you can look at my battle plans.

It's all laid out right here. Boss, I can't tell who anyone is. Well, you got to really look at it to understand it. Like, that's you guys right here.

[35:55] And see, that's Brooklyn. That's when we're going to get them dogs. Bam! Bam! That ball of fluff's got to screw loose.

Let's skedaddle. Bam, but you get it. You see what I'm saying. That rabbit.

He had crazy eyes. There ain't no cure on what's wrong with that thing. Gidget, here's an idea. Maybe there's a dog in the neighborhood that looks like Max.

Start hanging out with him. After a while, you'll think it's him. You'll be done. We are not just giving up. We're dedicated. We're loyal. We're easily the greatest pet ever.

We're dogs. Cat. Hawk. We're dogs! Not really. There's a lot of people that don't look like us, don't act like us, don't seem like us.

[36:56] Some of them might even have crazy eyes. And you'll think there's no cure for that. Are there people we don't want to see? It's inconvenient.

It's troubling. We don't look at them. You know, we've been doing these little things to get you all to know each other a little bit better. So today, we're going to do it right here, right now.

Okay? It's pretty simple. Somebody said to me, when I come to church, all I ever see is the backs of people's heads. So I wish they'd turn around. And then I thought, well, if everybody turns around, you're still just going to see the backs of people's heads. So that's not helping anything.

You'll just see different backs of the heads, right? So here's what I want you to do. I want you to look around you and ideally find somebody that you don't know very well, okay? But just anybody. I want you to take about 20 seconds and just say, good morning.

It's good to see you. That's all. Okay, now I said 20 seconds.

[37:55] I don't want you to get carried away with this friendliness stuff, okay? All right, people start thinking we're a church or something, all right? We don't want people to get the wrong idea. Do we see the people that are hard to see?

Can we embrace the unembraceable? Can we love people that are hard to love?

Some of you know that a couple of weeks ago, I was in the hospital. Kind of a sort of an unexpected thing. It happened on a Friday night and about 4.30 in the morning as I'm sitting in the emergency room.

See what happened is I was at home and I started shaking uncontrollably until I was in such pain that we just decided I had to go to the hospital because, you know, nothing was fixing it. And they told me I was severely dehydrated from what appeared to be a virus.

They weren't sure. And so this doctor came in at 4.30 on Saturday morning and said, okay, well, you should be okay, but you're going to be in for two or three days. What?

[38:56] Saturday morning. I can't do that, dude. You don't know what I do. Well, that's what you're doing. So guess who got a text at 6 o'clock in the morning? Hey, Pastor Lisa, guess what? You're on.

And I'm sure she did a wonderful job. They took me upstairs on the floor. And it was so cool because I said, hey, I've got a private room.

This is so nice. But, you know, there aren't a lot of hospital rooms that have two doors. So I went in the first door and it went whoosh. And then they opened the second one. And I thought, that's weird.

And then they all started wearing these gowns and gloves and things. I'm being isolated. I'm like being completely cut off.

And I could see when the nurses and people came in, they were like, out of here, you know. They weren't wearing masks. They told me whatever they thought I had was not, you know, past that way, which was good because I had just, you know, breathed on like a thousand of you.

[39:58] So I was feeling better about that, right? But basically, I really didn't know why I was in this room. And what I found out when my wife came in, because when she came in, she had the gloves and the gown on and this look on her face like she had, you know, seen a ghost.

And they had told her, and I don't remember the name of it, that they were afraid I had this highly contagious, permanently damaging disease. And I'm like, what?

What? Because I'm sure she walked in and they told her she had to wear the gloves and gowns. She said, I'm his wife. I've been around him all week. I don't need to do it. But she put him on.

And she visited me. What would have happened if you came up to the hospital that day and found me in that room? Would you have put on the gloves and the gown and come in to say hello?

Or would you have said, I don't think so. Maybe what I have, I don't, he has, I don't want to get. Now, I'd understand that, by the way, in a temporary condition like that.

[41:09] I go to visit people in those circumstances, but I understand that, that we have a concern. But people didn't want to go near this guy simply because they were afraid that his problem could become their problem.

They don't want to look like they have anything to do with him. Because he's not exactly the top of society. He sits over here on a mat. Probably doesn't look very good because, you know, blind people have a hard time seeing in the mirror what they, you know, right?

He wears this blindfold thing, which makes him look strange. And why does he do that? Well, it's the same reason why people nowadays who are blind, you know, they wear dark glasses. You think that's because it helps them to see better through the dark glasses?

That's for you. So you won't get creeped out, you follow? And he begs for a living. Well, we say, well, we'd want to associate with him after he was healed, right?

But would we really? I mean, after all, this is kind of a guy who's got now a strange life. He spent his whole life with only one occupational talent.

[42:21] Let's say he's 30-something years old. And the only thing he knows how to do is to say, you got some money for a blind man? What's he going to do now?

Walk around with his little tin can and say, excuse me, can you help out a guy who used to be blind? And you're going to say, get a job, you bum.

It's the only job I know. And so we disassociate with broken people. We look at them and say, what's wrong with them?

Why are they acting this way? Must be because there's something wrong in their lives. They're sinners. So they took them to the religious people to have them checked out.

That's a good thing to do, see what the religious, good, loving religious people said. And they said, so, tell us what happened. And they said, well, you know, I was sitting there collecting my coins.

[43:25] And this guy came along. I think his name is Jesus. And he put mud on my eyes and then told me to wash my eyes off. And then I was healed.

I said, on the Sabbath day he did that? He's a sinner. You're a sinner. You were a sinner from birth. Get out of here. Wow.

You see, that's what oftentimes people feel like. People who feel like their lives are broken or having struggles or falling apart. Or they don't exactly measure right in between those lines on the level.

They come to the good church people and the good church people say, you can sit over there. They used to have the benches in the back. They called them the sinner's bench. You know what they were for? They were for the people who were too poor to get a nice seat up front.

Glad we don't do that anymore. Can we learn to love people who are broken?

[44:27] They told them, you were steeped in sin from your birth. And yet you would teach us. Could we actually think that people like this might have something to say to us? People who are obviously dysfunctional and messed up.

And if you remember, I think it was last Easter, but it might have been the year before. That I showed up for the sermon and I had on a wig and, you know, old crummy clothes and things. Anybody remember this?

And I walked in the sanctuary and I sat down and amongst the people, they all moved over, you know. And I thought everybody would see through my costume, but evidently they didn't.

Because as I was walking up to preach, I had four people after service tell me they had their hand on a gun. And they were going to take me out if I went the wrong way. Really, they're going to blow the pastor away if I moved the wrong way.

That's kind of scary, you know. It really is, right? I know they were trying to protect. I'm not trying to pick on anybody here. And nobody shot me, which is good. Pastor Suzanne Block, you remember, some of you remember her?

[45:25] She did this in her church. They had her arrested. Called the police and they were hauled away. Because we can't learn from people that don't look like us, that aren't like us, that don't smell right, look like, talk right.

It's hard. And even more so, we might get in trouble for associating with them in the first place. So let's take a look at this story. Jesus, you know Jesus, he used to heal people by just saying, be healed.

And they would get up and walk. Let your eyes be open. Right? He'd do these miracles all the time. But for some reason, this time, right, he takes some dirt.

Bam! Right in the guy's eyes, right? Talk about like, really? So now this guy's not only blind and disheveled and everything else. He's got mud and spit running down his face, right?

So he says, go down to the pool there and wash up. Now, that's just weird, right? But it was the Sabbath day, the day that the rules said that nobody was supposed to work.

[46:35] So what Jesus was doing, he was intentionally breaking the rules. See, telling him to travel was breaking the rules. Telling him to wash on that day was breaking the rules.

And this thing with the spit and the mud, that's called making mortar. And it's against the rules. So Jesus intentionally broke the rules that say you're not supposed to work on the Sabbath.

But Jesus had something to say about the Sabbath and Mark. He said, the Sabbath was made for people, not people for the Sabbath. It's there for our recreation, for our healing, for our rest.

We're losing the concept of the Sabbath. It's disappearing. Sunday's becoming any day. Sunday's becoming any day. It's no longer the Lord's day. It's just a day. Some people don't even think about God one day a week.

So we do need rules, and rules are good. They help to keep us in order and keep us safe and keep us working as a culture and a society. But sometimes the rules should be suspended for something more important.

[47:51] So we get to the hospital, right? Over at Suburban. And we're pulling towards the emergency room. And we're looking for where to park. They've got reserved parking spaces for the emergency room.

They're about a mile and a half from the door. Have you ever seen them? It's like, seriously? This is where we're parking? I get out of the car, and I'm like, ah, ah, ah, ah, ah. Really?

Really? And you're going up to the door, and you think, well, you could go drive up. No parking! Don't you come in here! We will shoot you if you get anywhere near this door, you know? It's like, really?

I get it. I get it. They need to keep it open for ambulances and emergencies. It's an emergency room! Some of us need to get dropped off at the door! They've got parking spaces for all kinds of other people that can walk in front of those parking spaces for the people who need them, right?

That's like, wow. Can you break the rules sometimes? If it's better. If it's going to mean something good is going to happen. But see, our problem is, we struggle with this.

[48:59] And we worry, what do the rules say? Not what does God say. We worry about, what will people talk about us instead of what will God say about us? We're so concerned about what everyone else thinks.

When all we should be concerned about is what God, our Creator, thinks. It's risky. We could become outcasts ourselves.

They went to see these religious leaders. They even called in His parents. And they said, is this your son? They said, yeah, I think that's our son. But we want nothing to do with this.

We don't want to get kicked out of the church, really. Right? Did you notice the disciples are nowhere to be seen? Just disappeared. They're not even in this story, basically.

All these good, wonderful followers of Jesus have done nothing. And the religious leaders booted this guy out. They're kind of put on trial.

[50:01] And basically, he says, what do you want to believe in him too? And that just made him crazy. See, following God can get us on the outs with a lot of people that could cause us trouble.

Some people don't want to risk that issue. So, here's this guy. He's out in the streets wandering around. Remember, he used to be blind. He doesn't know where he's going.

Even though his eyes are open, he's never seen anything before. Right? So, all this stuff is new to him. And, in fact, probably confuses him. I could see him closing his eyes so he could see how to get around. Right? Okay, let me see now.

If I close my eyes, this is where the market is. Okay, I hear the birds. Right? But he's got his eyes open. So, he's all confused. He doesn't know where to go. Nobody's trying to help him. Nobody's trying to find him. His parents ditch him.

All the people ditch him. The disciples aren't anywhere. Who shows up to take care of him? Jesus. Jesus. Thank God for Jesus.

[51:00] Amen? Jesus. Because he needs Jesus. Do our lives point to Jesus?

Do we even see Jesus? Do we see the power of Jesus in what we're doing? People ask me how I got cured. You know? I'll tell you the truth. All they did was put an IV in me. They said all the liquids are going through me.

I needed IVs. That drinking water wasn't going to help me. So, I had to have IVs. That's all they did. They didn't even give me any medicine or anything. I said, boy, that's what they did to cure me. That's what I told everybody.

And I thought, duh. You know how I got healed? Jesus did it. That's how I got healed. If we counted on doctors and nurses and emergency rooms to heal every virus and every bacterial infection we ever had, we would be in real trouble, don't you think?

Because 90% of these things just seem to go away on their own. Because God heals us. We don't point to God. We point to everybody else.

[52:04] Everything else. Everybody else. They could see that there was a change in this man.

Can they see by the way we act, the way we talk, and what we do that we're different? On the day that I was leaving the hospital, I took a shower.

I don't know if you know anything about hospitals, but usually you don't take a shower. So you like laying there in bed, you know, these weird gowns that are open in the back, right? You know, your hair gets all kind of messed up and you look sort of grungy and such.

You haven't shaved and things. So I took a shower. I shaved. I put on regular, you know, street clothes because my wife was going to come. I didn't know when. Now, in the meantime, nobody visited me, which was one of the most wonderful Sundays I ever had, sitting there just reading the paper, watching old movies, relaxing.

I thought this was kind of sweet, you know? Kind of stuff other people do. I thought it was kind of cool, you know? So anyways, I went out. My wife called.

[53:02] I went out to the nurse, my nurse, right to the nurse's station to the nurse. It's my nurse. And I said, my wife's coming in about half an hour. I just want to let you know so you get the paperwork and things together. She looks up at me. She says, who are you?

I said, I'm the guy from that room, but I'm cleaned up. That's all, right? You know? They couldn't recognize this guy because he didn't look the same. Well, yeah, he's combed his hair

His eyes are open. He looks a lot better, right? He looks a lot better. He looks like maybe something happened to him. Do people see the change in us because of what God does through us and for us?

And the change isn't just physical, but sometimes it is. See, when Jesus found this man, he said, do you believe?

He didn't say, do you like being able to see? He didn't say, wasn't that a cool miracle? He says, do you believe? See, us Christians have this idea in our head that if we believe enough, we'll all be healed of all our problems.

But if you read this story, it says, he was healed and then believed. Not he believed and then he was healed. Do you follow? Because healing is the point to believing.

Those of you who already believe don't need to be healed. I know that isn't what you want to hear, but it's the truth. Because if we're changed in our lives, in our souls, we shouldn't need those healings.

Because Paul, probably arguably one of the most incredible Christians ever to walk the face of the earth, the Apostle Paul, he talked about a problem he has in chapter 12 of Corinthians.

It says, therefore, in order to keep me from becoming conceited, don't you love that? In order to keep me from becoming conceited, I was given a thorn in my flesh, a messenger of Satan to torment me.

Three times I pleaded with the Lord to take it away from me. And he said to me, my grace is sufficient for you. My power is made perfect in weakness. So I'm going to boast all the more gladly about my weakness so that Christ's power can rest on me.

You don't need to be healed to believe. You don't need to have everything fixed in you. All you need is to turn to God and let his love embrace you.

And then go out and embrace the unembraceable. Because if you do, some amazing things can happen. Goodbye.
