We pray for this world. There is so much struggle and so much turmoil, Lord God. We just ask in Jesus' name that you would help us to see your purpose in all that we are enduring here in this earth.

[23:04] We pray, Lord God, that in the midst of so many voices crying out for justice in so many different ways, that we would see your idea of justice, what you have made justice to really be.

so often, Lord God, we rely on ourselves, the way we see the world, the way we think things should be. Help us to see things the way you see them.

Help us to seek justice, not according to our selfish ambition or our desires that are not perfect. help us to desire to see and do things according to your will and your good purpose.

Help us to understand what is right and just and merciful according to your terms, not our own.

Lord God, we pray in Jesus' name that we may be lights in dark places as we shine forth your great love and your mercy wherever we go.

[24:30] We thank you for those things that are in us that are good because you have put them there because you are the one who has made us good. We ask, Lord God, that now as we continue in worship, as we hear your word, as we continue to pray and to sing your praises, that you will wash over us and transform us.

Take away those things that are of ourselves that are not from you. Make us to be like Jesus. Be with Pastor Thomas.

He delivers the message that you have called him to share with us this day. Let it be a blessing to him and to us. all our worship would be a blessing to you and we go forth from this place knowing you more, seeing you more.

[25:59] Amen. Amen. Amen. This is the account of the heavens and the earth when they were created, when the Lord God fed the earth and the heavens.

Now no shrub had yet appeared on the earth, and no plants had yet sprung up. For the Lord God had not yet set rain on the earth, and there was no one to work the ground. But streams came up from the earth, and watered the whole surface of the ground.

Then the Lord God formed a man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living being. Now the Lord God had planted a garden in the east, in Eden, and there he put the man he had formed.

The Lord God made all kinds of trees grow out of the ground, trees that were pleasing to the eye and good for food. In the middle of the garden were the tree of life, and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

A river watering the garden flowed from Eden, and there it was separated into four headwaters. The name of the first is Pishon. It winds through the entire land of Avila, where there is gold. The gold of that land is good, and a romantic resin and onyx are also there.

[27:03] The name of the second river is Gihon. It winds through the entire land of Cush. The name of the third river is Tigris. It runs along the east side of Asher. And the fourth river is Euphrates.

The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden, to work it and take care of it. And the Lord God commanded the man, You are free to eat from any tree in the garden, but you must not eat from the tree of knowledge of good and evil.

For when you eat from it, you will certainly die. This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God. This morning, we're looking at the book of Genesis.

We've been walking our way through the book of Genesis, reading right from the very beginning, to see what it has to say to us about the secrets of the kingdom of heaven. How can we access the kingdom of heaven more completely in our lives and in our world?

And this is what we call a creation story, how people were created and made. In the ancient days, they had a lot of mythology and lots of different ideas of how people were made.

[28:07] Most of them started off a little differently. In the Bible, it starts off by saying the world was good and made good. In most ancient stories, it says the world is bad.

It's scary. It's dangerous. It's spooky. It's a kind of place that you're going to get hurt if you don't watch out for it. How many of you have ever been to Iron Island Museum?

Anybody? It's right here in western New York. We're looking at little-known facts and places to visit in western New York. Iron Island Museum. It's in Lovejoy.

You know down there in the Bailey Clinton area? And it talks about the history of Lovejoy. But it's also haunted. It has spooks in it, they say.

And so the ghost hunters have come from around the country to check out Iron Island Museum. Maybe you should go check it out. We have different ways of looking at our lives.

[29:09] And sometimes, without even realizing it, we put brokenness and confusion and a sense that the world is messed up into our world. Rock-a-bye baby on a treetop.

When the wind blows, the cradle will rock. When the bough breaks, the cradle will fall. Really? Seriously? We sing this to little tiny babies and children?

Don't worry. We'll stick you up in a tree so you can fall and shatter. Really? Have you ever thought about the stuff we put into our world, which is really just a theology of brokenness?

Yeah, my better days are behind me. When I was a teenager, I was strong and healthy. Now, life stinks and pretty soon I'll die. You ever heard anybody say that? You see, the problem is that life is made up of different ways of sin.

For some people, life is just a series of possibilities, probabilities, and coincidences. Some people believe that all we are is a combination of water, dirt, and chemicals.

[30 : 25] And we can understand it. Even this passage says God made us out of the dirt. It was dry ground until water came up and brought life to the world.

From the dust we were made to dust we will return. Have you ever noticed at the end of life, some people are reduced down to a little pile of dust?

Is that what we are? A little bit of dust? A little bit of dirt that comes and goes? To some degree we are.

We're the children of Adam. And so it's true. We are mortal. We're vulnerable. There's brokenness and pain and disappointment and sin and problems and struggles in our lives.

1 Corinthians, which Sherry read for us earlier in the service, says that we're taken from the dust of the earth. And as was the earthly man, Adam, so are we.

[31:30] Made from dust to dust we will return. Anybody ever hear the poem, The Dash? It's kind of an interesting poem. It says that a person got up at someone's memorial and spoke about how they were born at a certain point.

And then they have a date on the other end of the tombstone. And all of our lives is contained in that dash, that little line. And the question is, what are you going to do with your dash?

What are you going to do with that place in between? Iron Island Museum is based on the dash. The dash of the place called Lovejoy.

Lovejoy was a booming kind of community, prosperous. It was a place where there was always industry and strength. That's why it's called Iron Island Museum.

Right around the corner we have the grain elevators. These things were amazing. Ships came from all over the Great Lakes to deposit their grain in Buffalo, New York, where it was refined and sent out on trains or the Erie Canal or all sorts of different ways.

[32:39] You know, these things are not all over the world. Those of us who live in western New York, we think you can go visit grain elevators and they're just sort of kind of big, hunky, concrete things.

But they're not common. There's very few places that even have ever seen anything like this. And to us, they're all over the place. They represent our industrial past. You can go and see them.

I think there's even a place you can go inside of some of them. Kind of cool. In the past, we used to build cars in Buffalo, New York. Did you know that? There were car companies headquartered here like the Pierce Arrow.

There's a Pierce Arrow Museum downtown. You can go look at the cars we used to build. Pretty cool cars. They were considered some of the best cars in America. They were built right here in Buffalo, New York.

Now we can see them in the museum. Another part of our past was those very trains that carried the grain away. Anybody here ever been to the Central Terminal?

[33:40] Central Terminal. This amazing edifice on the east side of Buffalo, about three blocks from the Iron Island Museum. The concourse was spectacular.

With the big buffalo on the clock and filled, filled with people. It was when our dash was strong. And what we felt successful, Buffalo, New York, was the eighth largest city in America.

It was the powerhouse of this country. It drove the economy of our nation. What is life?

What's it all about? Is it what we do in that time in between, that dash? What's the purpose of our lives? The writer of Ecclesiastes, King Solomon said, I know there's nothing better for people than to be happy and do good while they live.

To eat and drink and find satisfaction in all their toil. This is a gift of God. God made us to eat and drink and be happy and do good and enjoy the work of our hands.

[35:02] It's part of what life is about. God, it says, made a garden. We don't know exactly this garden's location, but it actually mentions the Tigris and Euphrates River, which are in the region of Iraq.

The other rivers no one's ever really found. We're not sure what they are. There was a garden. It was a beautiful garden. Eden means pleasure.

It was a garden of pleasure. A garden of joy. A garden of blessing. Where we were placed as human beings to work in.

God has put us in this world for a purpose, and that includes work. Not work to be misery, but work that we enjoy, work that we're proud of, work that we find amazing, work that touches our very being.

And God intends us to live in joy and pleasure and goodness.

[36:06] We are not just dirt. We're not just a random collection of chemicals that happen to somehow, in some weird way, find themselves into our location.

For much more than that. In the book of Corinthians, Pastor Sherry also read, The first man, Adam, was of the dust of the earth.

And the second man, Christ, is of heaven. As was with the earthly man, so are those who are of the earth. And as is with the heavenly man, so are those who are of heaven.

Just as we've borne the image of the earthly man, we shall bear the image of the heavenly man. You see, the difficulty is, too often we see our lives as just being that dash.

And then it's done. But as Christians, we don't believe that the dash is the most important part on that dateline. The most important part is, that comes after the second date.

[37:12] Because we believe that there's life after life. And that gives us something called hope. And hope is a key to the kingdom of heaven. With hope, we can access the wonder, and the joy, and the pleasure, and the intention that God had for us.

All of us. Adam means humanity. All of humanity. That's what the word actually means. That we were made to access the wonder, the incredible blessing of God.

We are not just piles of dirt. We are the children of God. As Corinthians said, we are children of Christ. In verse 7 of this passage in Genesis, it says that God breathed into us.

Breathed into us. And we became living beings. The word actually is nephesh in Hebrew.

And what we usually interpret it to mean is souls. We became souls. We became something more than just dust and dirt and creatures of this world.

[38:20] We became something related to God in heaven. We are something more than just this shell that carries us through our lives. We are living souls.

Children of Christ. Children of God. And because we have a promise of eternity, we have hope even when life seems hopeless. Amen? It's a key to the kingdom.

If we lose hope, we lose everything. Amen. In Ecclesiastes, it says that we're supposed to do good. We're supposed to enjoy our lives.

God made us to do good, to be good, to know good, to live a good life. All the trees in the garden were available for us to eat from. Oranges and apples and pears and bananas.

We could eat from all the trees in the garden, even the tree of life. There was only one tree we weren't supposed to eat from, right? Only one tree.

[39:21] It was called the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. That's a troubling thing. And we will talk more about this when we talk about evil, that snake, in a couple of weeks.

But I want to talk to you about this tree. You see, the problem is when we see this, it makes us start to think that what God doesn't want is God doesn't want us to have knowledge. God doesn't want us to be smart.

God doesn't want us to know things. But you see, this is a tree of the knowledge of good and evil. And what you need to remember is God made us, and when he made us, he said that we were good.

He already put the knowledge of goodness in us. You have the knowledge of goodness because you're created in the image of God. So you already know good. You see, God wasn't trying to keep the knowledge of goodness from you.

God was trying to keep you from the knowledge of evil. You see? God wants you to have the knowledge of good. God wants you to live in the knowledge of good.

[40:29] God wants you to understand the good and the blessing and the pleasure and the joy.

God just doesn't want you to taste from the knowledge of evil. Because when we eat from the knowledge of evil, it leads to brokenness and pain, struggles, and death.

When we were little children, do you remember? We didn't think about those things. We had joy. We had wonder. We had blessing. Every day was an adventure. We didn't think about how our parents drive.

We just trusted them and thought they were good drivers. Right? We lived in a world where there were no problems, and who cared who was president? It didn't matter. Every day was just an opportunity to live into the goodness that God created.

But then we taste of that evil, and we start to focus on the evil, on the temporary, on the broken, and the failures, on the sin.

And so we looked at this mighty city that was Buffalo, and the grain elevators became empty, deserted, piles of concrete on the waterfront, and who's going to even be able to afford to tear them down?

[41:48] Just eyesores in the life of our living. The central terminal, the roof started giving way. There were rats and creatures and vandals going in and breaking up the beauty of the central terminal, selling what they could, destroying what was left.

And if you go to the Lovejoy area, where Irons Island Museum is, you will find places that look like a war zone. Instead of prosperity and strength, it looks like death, and brokenness, and pain, and destruction, and despair.

We started talking that way. And so, even though we were created for some wonderful purpose by God, we can find ourselves stuck in sadness, and anger, and brokenness, and envy of other people, just try to do what we're supposed to do.

We feel like everybody else did something better. It even feels like God himself has left us alone to bless somebody else. It's easy to get focused on the brokenness, and the pain, and the struggle, and the knowledge of evil.

God didn't intend for that. And so, through Jesus, he gives us a way back to goodness. A way back to the garden, but it means that we have to refocus who we are.

[43:23] We have to put aside some of the things we've decided are necessary, and become someone that we remember being. In the book of Matthew, Jesus said, truly, I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you'll never enter the kingdom of heaven.

Unless you can find a way back to that joy, that trust, that hope, that possibility, those dreams, and blessings, and wonders, of being a child, you'll be stuck outside the garden, and in brokenness and pain for the rest of your life.

God wants us to have hope. It's not easy. In life, we have some people we refer to as handicapped.

They have something about them that they were born differently. Maybe they can't walk like some can, or their arms aren't the same, or maybe they have something wrong with their eyesight, or their thinking.

There's lots of ways people are handicapped. It's difficult. We try to give them a little extra, because they have struggles right from the beginning. We sometimes refer to my mother as being handicapped, but my mother wasn't handicapped.

[44:38] My mother was crippled. That might sound harsh, but it's different. My mother had run, and played, and danced, and done all the things that we do, until one day, she was struck by polio, and she couldn't walk anymore, like other people.

She couldn't run. She couldn't dance. You know, it's hard to live a life when you see other people that have things you don't have. It's even harder when you've had them, and you no longer have them, and you feel that loss.

You see, and that's what happens at a certain point in our life. We start to feel like we've lost something, like something's missing, like somehow it got broken. I learned about hope from my mother.

My mother was the kind of woman that didn't let this difficulty, this brokenness, define her. She was smiling all the time.

She was the life of every gathering she ever went to. Everybody knew my mother. Everybody liked my mother. Even when my mother was 82 years old and confined to a wheelchair, my mother had a boyfriend in North Carolina and a boyfriend in New York, and another guy who went up to New England because she wouldn't marry him.

[45:57] Three guys chasing after my mother. I'm like, what? Because in spite of the fact that she had things broken about her, she refused to live in the brokenness and always lived in hope and the promise that God gives to us.

Someone once said, success doesn't lead to happiness. Happiness leads to success. We think if we could just be successful, we'll be happy.

But the truth is, there's lots of people our world would call successful that are not happy. And there's a lot of people our world would say are not necessarily successful the way we'd want to be that seem to be happy.

Because some choose life, goodness, and the fruit that God gave you naturally. 1 Corinthians 15 again says to us, so it will be with the resurrection of the dead.

The body that's sown is perishable, but it's raised imperishable. It's sown in dishonor, but it's raised in glory. It's sown in weakness, but it's raised in power.

[47:06] It's sown in natural body, but it's raised a spiritual body. And if there is a natural body, there is a spiritual body and there is hope. We don't just live in the dash. We live beyond the dash, beyond the date, beyond this world.

And blessings and joy that God intends for us. And that hope can change our world here, right now. They did a study. They took people who were considered clinically severely depressed.

Severely depressed. They took 50 of them. And they had them do one thing. At the end of the day, they were supposed to think of three things that went well that day. They said, they don't have to be great successes.

It could be like, I like my dinner. You know, I got to work without being killed. I mean, it could be real simple, easy things, but three things that went well that day.

And they did this for one week, seven days. At the end of seven days, can you imagine these people went from severely depressed to mildly depressed. Imagine what would happen if they did it longer.

[48:13] and if they did it more. We call it counting your blessings in our faith. Philippians says it this way, finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable, if anything is excellent or praiseworthy, think about such things.
